Weekly message from DG COMM

Dear European EDICs,

This week finds you performing your precious duties amidst a patchwork of new regional or national **lockdowns**, **riots** in many towns against this excruciating prospect and signs of a new surge of **terrorism** as we see in Vienna and Nice.

Under these challenging circumstances, it goes without communication saying that your activities can and should be modulated as much as possible to the legitimate anxieties of your fellow citizens and to their immediate expectations towards the EU. Please don't refrain from adjusting the tone of your plans or of your social media activities if you deem it appropriate. For example, solidarity is very visible already! President von der Leyen said the EU could vaccinate 700 million people with large supplies of vaccines due to begin in April, transfer of intensive care patients across borders is already under way and short term unemployment schemes supported with real EU billions via the SURE mechanism are now a reality. But also look ahead, there is not only Covid: the adequate minimum wage proposal adopted last week is there to show that the EU is not completely overwhelmed by the crisis. The EU remains a project about dignity and future, and you are courageously part of it in these difficult days!



The big picture

Mechanism.

A collective effort: now more than ever. The members of the European Council met for a video conference on Thursday to coordinate their next moves against the upsurge of the virus. EU leaders discussed how to build a <u>common approach to testing, quarantine, and the exchange of data</u> at EU level. Hospitals risk being overwhelmed by the second wave of the pandemic. The Commission has made €220 million available to <u>transfer intensive care patients across borders</u> from overcrowded hospitals to less pressured structures.

Europe to the rescEU. The Czech Republic is among the hardest hit Member States: following a request for assistance from Prague, the Commission quickly <u>dispatched a first batch of 30 ventilators</u> from the rescEU common European reserve of medical equipment. Additional ventilators will soon be sent to the Czech Republic, 105 from the Netherlands and 15 from Austria, through the EU Civil Protection

Let EU money flow. The first instalment of SURE funds raised from the financial markets <u>has been disbursed last Tuesday</u> to Italy (€10 billion), Spain (€6 billion) and Poland (€1 billion). The Council has so far approved €87.9 billion in financial support under SURE to 17 Member States; further disbursements will follow in the next months, as soon as new bonds are issued.

Landmark proposal for the dignity of work! On Wednesday, the Commission adopted a proposal for a directive to ensure that workers in the EU are protected by adequate minimum wages. At EU level, this is unprecedented. More details below.

What's in it for you?

- 1. We need from you an extra communication effort amidst this pandemic: not only in presenting the Commission's <u>additional measures against the virus</u> like the EU <u>vaccination strategy</u>, but also countering false, misleading and dangerous information that continues to circulate.
- 2. Don't forget spreading the news about the first round of real money from the SURE mechanism: it means economic aid from the EU arrives even if the "Next Generation EU" package is not yet finally approved. You should raise awareness on the fact that help is flowing, and it is very concrete (here a reminder of how SURE works).
- 3. Give adequate relevance to the proposal on adequate minimum wages: helping Member States establish minimum wages was a promise von der Leyen made in her <u>State of the Union speech</u> last September. It is understandably a landmark proposal, but you should also stress that its framework fully respects the subsidiarity principle, as well as the autonomy of Member States and social partners when it comes to negotiating minimum wage levels.

As more and more regions across Europe start restricting again physical meetings and public gatherings, we received questions about how to carry on the activities that you have scheduled for the coming months.

This, of course, is also true for the four months extension and the communication priorities therein, should preventive rules be still there at the beginning of 2021.
